Communication and Dementia

This week's Web Pick(s) report on two projects designed to enhance communication for people with dementia.

Facilitated Life Story Writing for Individuals with Dementia for Conversational Remembering Boxes, 2004.

http://www1.sheridaninstitute.ca/research/serc/docs/SERC_4.pdf The goal of this study, conducted in the summer of 2004, was to enhance the experience of personhood in individuals with dementia through the use of

computer mediated life story writing for conversational remembering boxes. Eight male participants with dementia with paired with student researchers. Interviews were taped, recorded and transcribed to served as a foundation for personal memory boxes.

The results of this study were published in the Sheridan Elder Research Center (SERC: at The Sheridan Institute for Technology and Advanced Learning, Oakville, Ontario) Report Series, 2004.

In February, 2007, three more documents were released by Alzheimer's Australia which provide more practical information and advice. They are based on the original document; on the best evidence available; on the long experience of workers and carers who have cared for people living with dementia and supported their families, and on discussions in focus groups at the Dementia Care Consensus Conference in August 2006 for managers and staff working in nursing homes.

1. Quality Dementia Care: A Guide to Practice for Managers in Residential Aged Care Facilities

<http://www.alzheimers.org.au/upload/QDC21.pdf> The purpose of this paper is to link in practical terms the principles of good quality dementia care to the framework of the aged care accreditation standards. It is

intended as a practical check-list of things that will help staff manage facilities for people living with dementia whether they are mainstream residential care facilities or special units.

2. Quality Dementia Care: A guide to practice in residential aged care facilities for all staff, February 2007

<http://www.alzheimers.org.au/upload/QDC11.pdf> This paper provides all workers (nurses, care workers, activity/lifestyle staff, other care staff, domestic staff, kitchen staff, gardeners etc.) who provide care for older people living with dementia, with practical information to help them deliver best practice person-centred care, in a residential setting. The paper may also be useful for staff providing support or care to people living with dementia in the community or for people caring in a voluntary capacity for older family members or friends living with dementia.

3. Quality Dementia Care: Nurturing the Heart

Developing Technology Systems to Support the Continuum of Care - Engaging Facilities, Patients, and Caregivers

Care Transitions Teleconference Series: Finding Solutions, Improving Care Coordination

During this one-hour session, Ronald Stock, MD, MA, Medical Director for Medical Education and Research, and Geriatrics, Peace Health Oregon Region, will discuss care delivery features that improve geriatric care across the continuum.
